City of Fullerton – Communities of Interest

- Historic Downtown Area Golden Hills neighborhood north of Milford and Chapman, south to Ash, west to Euclid, and east to Raymond.
 - Whiting neighborhood Raymond, and Chapman and westside of Hartford
 - Diverse, single-family homes, family renters
 - Narrow frontage (close to neighbors), walkable
 - \circ $\;$ Stater brothers on Euclid, newer grocery store on Raymond $\;$
 - Milford Elementary School
 - Cohesive neighborhood, people want to participate and be close to downtown
 - Issues associated with being close to the Downtown Bars and traffic on Habor and Euclid
- Eastern Portion of Council District 3 east of 57 freeway, microneighborhoods attached to Placentia Ave
 - Diverse
 - In the southern region, parking and traffic are major issues due to high-density residential land use and Universities
 - Old housing, nonfamily units are leased out and rented causing parking issues, maintenance issues
 - Diverse incomes and ages in residents, and housing, challenges with parking, access to basic services and shopping opportunities
- Eastside of Fullerton east of 57 freeway, east end of Cal State Fullerton
 - Vast majority of Cal State Fullerton students live along Placentia Ave and in the far east corner
 - Board between District 3 and District 2
 - Acacia Elementary School, Rosary Academy, Troy High school, Sierra Vista Elementary School, Rolling Hills Elementary School
- Historic District Near Downtown
 - Walking distance to downtown,
 - Downtown is fractured in current maps
 - Historic districts de-mark smaller and older housing, occupied by lower-income housing
 - \circ $\;$ North of the historic district is newer income and more expensive
 - Lower-income housing areas are more concerned with cost of housing
- Area around Downtown District corridor
 - All districts around Downtown should share a piece of Downtown
- Northwest Fullerton west and north city boundaries, east of Euclid, South of Milford,
 - Arboretum in the Eastside
 - Amerige Heights
 - New development pressure towards the westside of Coyote Hills
 - Recent pressure for growth near Rosecrans, Euclid, and Bastenchury
 - Single-detached homes, large Asian community
- Fullerton Airport in District 4
- Saint Jude Hospital area in District 2

- The population that lives along the Downtown corridor should have its own district
- West Downtown Area
 - Surrounds historic downtown
 - Neighborhoods around that downtown define a specific area with specific needs
 - Development pressure, higher density

Communities of Interest

- Between Fullerton High and Hillcrest Park (Hillcrest Historic District)
 - o Population unit 71
 - o West and east side have apartment complexes; near Fullerton High Stadium and college
 - Impacted by the traffic and activities by the high school
 - o Across Harbor Drive Hillcrest shopping center
 - o Different than the north side
- West end of downtown area (home built in 1924) section of homes that were built together
 - o Reaching across Chapman and south of Valley View
 - o Below Commonwealth and up to the railroad tracks
 - Community of walkers narrow frontage on the homes with windows that face the front and one car garages
 - o Grocery store on Euclid
 - o Parking impacts on the neighborhoods potential concern
 - East of Harbor Dr. core historic homes between Chapman and Commonwealth out to Raymond
- South of the railroad tracks Woodcrest Park (District 5) and Woodcrest Elementary School
 - o Distinct core to the west (currently District 4)
- Princeton Circle contiguous neighborhood
 - o Holiday celebrations together
 - o Brookdale cuts this neighborhood in half
 - o District 3 that touches downtown how can this be adjusted?
- Environmental justice as a community of interest
 - o Potential to add to Maptitude?

- o East corner of Fullerton (currently drawn as District 5)
- o Heavily polluted area
- District 5 between Chapman and Commonwealth
 - Smaller section Lemon and Balcom (historic area from the townsite) (built in 1910, 1920s)
 - o Large number of immigrant families
 - o Homeowners and renters
 - o Latino and white residents
 - o Low-income and moderate-income
 - o Cars and pedestrians
 - o Come up from the south end to get to Fullerton High
 - o Group homes and social services
 - o Consider the neighborhood to be downtown
 - o In the orbit of Fullerton College
 - o Size and style of homes vary
 - o Harbor to Raymond; Chapman to Commonwealth
 - o East and West of Lemon are in different districts
 - o If we restore downtown to its own district, how will we adjust the lines that affect neighborhoods?
- Abundance of fast food restaurants, communities finding affordable housing, looking for access to resources
 - o Fullerton College students becoming active in civic life
 - o North and South of Chapman Ave. income divide
 - o Asian and Latinx communities in Fullerton

- Asian community in Northwest district (current Asian majority district is District 1)
- Latinx community in Southwest district
- Should be kept together for language access and accommodations
- o Keep student voices together by keeping student housing together
- o Do not dilute voices that live in downtown Fullerton; keep them together
- Low-income, Latinx communities stay together
 - o Face the same issues: affordable housing, police accountability, pollution
 - o Youth communities all colleges in one district (including Optometry College)
- 3.5 colleges in the City
 - o Can we put all of the colleges in one district?
 - o District 3 has CSUF and Fullerton College

- Environments of Justice Commonwealth & Euclid, southeast
 - Affected by water pollutants, communities drink this water
- Railroad track south of Chapman heavy air pollution burdens
- Latinas District 5 by Lemon and Commonwealth
 - Beautifulness of Downtown Fullerton
 - Lives close to apartments that are low-income
 - Necessity to have low-income housing, community needs assistance to live with dignity
 - \circ Not a lot of security, need more medical care for homeless and disabled
 - Keep the community together to have one voice
- Orangethorpe & Highland
 - o Diverse community, residents are nice and get along
 - Wants apartment buildings to be administered, problems with building
 - Would like to be in D4 because of the schools
 - o Community where they can learn & grow, south of Chapman
 - Worried they could be divided Oakhurst & Richman
 - o Better developments for the lower-income residents
 - Lower part of Oakhurst is contaminated
 - Many who are homeless
 - Want social justice
- Richman Elementary School
 - East of Woods, South of Truslow, West of Harbor, all the way down to Orangethorpe
- Woodcrest Community keep together
 - Large Latinx population
 - East of Woods, North of 91, West of Highland
- Colleges to stay together, dense housing around colleges
 - Parking, security, educational issues
