Update on Homelessness

The City of Fullerton has been focused on addressing homelessness for many years. Over the last year the City has:

- Conducted a Safe Parking Program with Illumination Foundation and Pathways of Hope (project ceased on December 30)
- Opened two shelters as part of the North SPA (Service Planning Area) in Placentia and Buena Park
- In February 2020 received the Homeless Plan Committee Report
- Assisted Illumination Foundation with opening a Fullerton Navigation Center – 150 beds (90 shelter and 60 recuperative care)



Homeless Outreach

With the Opening of the Shelters – the City worked with Judge Carter on proactive engagement:

- Provided Notices to homeless encampment areas that camping is prohibited
- Worked with all service providers, County Health and Mental Health
 Services for four weeks of proactive engagement and offering of services
- With this engagement over 150 homeless were provided services, placed in shelters, reunification with family members



Continuing the Momentum

With the success of the proactive engagement the City would like to continue to provide service to the homeless and clean-up encampments:

- City to hire two part-time Homeless Case Managers one funded through Federal CDBG funds and to replace the former Homeless Coordinator that who has left the City
- The Homeless Police Liaison Officers will "hand-off" homeless clients to the Case Managers who will work with the clients to get them into shelters, housing, reunification.
- Includes assistance with California Identification Cards, obtaining Social Security Cards and what is required to become part of the County Continuum of Care efforts



Homelss Case Managers

The Case Managers will:

- Work with the community, non-profits and faith based groups
- Work with the County and be able to place homeless clients into the Continuum of Care to be eligible for housing and other services
- Relieve our Homeless Police Liaison Officers of follow-up with the clients to be able to focus on additional calls
- Case Managers are more cost effective
- Case Managers working for the City of Fullerton will be focused on our clients and providing services



North Orange County Public Safety Task Force (NOCPSTF)

- Formed through Budget Act of 2017 (Ting, 2017)
- To address:
 - Youth violence prevention/intervention
 - Reentry of offenders into communities
 - Homeless outreach/intervention
- Includes 10 cities Anaheim, Brea, Buena Park, Cypress, Fullerton, La Habra, La Palma, Placentia, Stanton, Yorba Linda
- Allocated \$20,000,000 over a four year period from June 2017 June 2021



- **•** 2017-2018 = \$310,000
- -2018-2019 = \$310,000
- -2019-2020 = \$270,000
- **•** 2020-2021 = \$310,000

Total: \$1,200,000



HOPE – Homeless Outreach and Proactive Engagement

- A concept to augment the efforts of the NOCPSTF funding when the need for Homeless Outreach is more than ever.
- A centralized home for the stakeholders and would create synergy of collaboration amongst the partners; thus, creating a hub of innovation where ideas are shared and resources are pooled all to better serve our homeless.



HOPE – Homeless Outreach and Proactive Engagement

- To include, but not limited to:
 - Orange County Health Care Agency (OCHCA)
 - Law Enforcement Homeless Liaison Officers from partner jurisdictions
 - Outreach Workers
 - Case Managers
 - Medical Personnel
- Collocate partners and service providers for centralized location and response
- Utilization of Outreach Grid app-based registry and resource guide and database



- Partner with local hospitals and ambulance services to develop healthcare mobile response units.
- To provide low-acuity medical intervention to homeless.
- Nurse & EMT to respond to triage low-level ailments and chemical dependency illnesses.



HOPE – Building

- City owned building formerly occupied by the Orange County Child Development Center.
 - 2050 Youth Way, Fullerton (Adjacent to St. Jude Hospital)
- City of Fullerton would host HOPE site and coordinate funding for building improvements



Hope Governance

- Potential Joint Powers Authority (JPA) Board or Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) of partner cities
- JPA or MOU could employ or contract for a director or manager that is an expert in the field of Homeless Outreach to lead HOPE.
- Governance would coordinate regional resources and policies for successful program.



- Discussion and formation of partnerships between cities, law enforcement and service providers.
- Continued coordination between cities of Fullerton and Buena Park who have already begun efforts to onboard case workers for launch of HOPE.
- Planning and coordination for HOPE building
- With the expiration of current funding in June 2021, establishing a plan for HOPE to implement in Spring 2021.
