Orange County Transportation Authority 2021 Pavement Management Relief Funding

Program Purpose and Background

- One time funding to provide assistance to the 34 eligible cities and the County of Orange for local streets maintenance and rehabilitation projects
- Intended to help offset loss of revenue that support local street maintenance and rehabilitation projects

Funding

- Funding comes from the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2021 (CRRSAA).
 - OCTA was provided \$14.951 million
 - \$10.932 million is used to fund this program
 - Remaining funds have already been programmed by OCTA
- Fullerton is expected to receive \$409,362
 - Allocation based on population with each agency guaranteed \$200,000



Type of Project

- Preventative Maintenance Slurry seal, crack sealing, etc.
- Rehabilitation Overlays, Cold-In-Place Recycling, Hot In-Place Recycling, etc.
- Reconstruction Replacement of entire pavement section

Eligible Expenses

- Construction
- Construction Engineering (up to 15% of project cost)
- Bicycle Lanes
- Repair/replacement of parking lanes, curbs, gutters, driveway approaches, catch basins, etc...
- Use of alternative materials such as rubberized asphalt, PCC, etc.
- Construction or modification of curb ramps to meet ADA requirements




Eligible Streets

- Must be federally eligible.
- Functionally classified as Minor Collector or above based on California Road System Map.

Important Dates

- Oct 18, 2021 INRAC recommends project
- Nov 16, 2021 City Council selects project and executes Resolution
- Dec 2021 Staff submits project to OCTA
- Mar 2022 Project approved by CTC (assumed)
- Apr 2022 Commence design process
- FY 22-23 Finalize project design and construction
 - April 1, 2023 Final date to obligate approved projects for funding through Caltrans



Project Selection Guidelines

- Funding to be used as a stand-alone project not additional/partial/matching funding for a programmed project or partnership project (i.e. joint City, private-public).
 - Federal funding requirements and time constraints create additional levels of administration
- During the July 14, 2021, INRAC recommended five policy guidelines for street rehabilitation.
 - Two policies are applicable for this funding

Policy Guideline #1 – Pavement Rehabilitation Method

- Arterial Streets Grind and Overlay preferred method
- Local Streets Grind and Overlay or ARAM with Slurry Seal preferred method

Policy Guideline #3 – Street Selection Criteria

- Streets only no alley rehabilitation
 - Equitable distribution of work throughout the City •
- Combine with Utility Work Water and/or Sewer
 - Street work may be completed as a separate project directly after utility work

- Bicycle Lanes
- Pavement Condition Index (PCI) Rating
- Condition of pavement compared to adjacent streets
- Traffic Volume and Number of Side Streets
- Planned Development/Improvements



Infrastructure and Natural Resources Advisory Committee (INRAC) recommendations are:

- Pursue a project that ensures 100% of the distribution will be utilized.
- Target a project that utilizes the funding in the actual construction cost, rather than construction inspection and management costs
- Preferred project is Associated Road from Yorba Linda Blvd to Bastanchury Road.
- Acceptable alternatives would be:
 - Acacia Avenue from Commonwealth Avenue to Chapman Avenue
 - Commonwealth Avenue from State College Blvd to Chapman Avenue

City Council has the option to select an alternative street segment



- 1. Confirm the recommended street segment recommended by the Infrastructure and Natural Resources Advisory Committee (INRAC).
 - Associated Road from Yorba Linda Blvd to Bastanchury Road
- 2. Adopt Resolution 2021-XX.
